In June of 1944, American aviator Roy Allen's B-17 was shot out of the sky over the French town of Jouy, where he was sheltered for weeks by Colette Florin, a young schoolteacher. Allen, Florin and the courageous Pierre Mulsant, captain of the local resistance circuit, and the relationships that developed among them form the core of Childers' tale of World War II.

A true story of heroism and endurance that has been pieced together from records and interviews, *In the Shadows of War* is told in a novelistic style, employing multiple points of view combined with an omniscient narrator's ability to divine the thoughts and feelings of the characters. It's an effective technique that keeps the reader in suspense, rapidly turning pages, racing forward to see what will happen. In its ability to capture the reader and portray the emotions of war, *Shadows* is in a class with Jack Higgins' semi-fictional *The Eagle Has Landed*.

Public libraries will want to offer this book as a great read. Academic libraries may want to consider it as well, but more as an example of a different way of telling history than as history itself.

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
